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## I. THE COLLEGE

Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar College (BRAC) came into existence on 8<sup>th</sup> Feb 1991 during the birth centenary year of Bharat Ratna Baba Saheb Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar with Dr. P.C. Patanjali as the founder Principal. It is a constituent co-educational college of the University of Delhi and is 100 % funded by Delhi Government. Since its inception, it has maintained its incessant momentum on the path of progress, both in academics and extra-curricular fields. The Principal, teaching & non-teaching Staff have dedicated themselves to build an environment of holistic and inclusive learning, inspiring the youth to create a fruitful and responsible future. The college completed its Silver Jubilee (25<sup>th</sup> year of operation) in 2016 and the year was celebrated with a number of academic events, workshops and conferences.

The college has a unique combination of academic and professional courses under the three year Bachelor Degree Programmes. The prominent academic programmes include B.Com & B.Com (Hons.), B.A. (Hons.) Geography, B.A. (Hons.) History and the evergreen B.A. (Programme). The college holds the unique distinction of being the forerunner in launching four professional courses of the University namely B.A. (Hons.) Hindi Journalism and Mass Communication which was introduced in 1994-95, B.A. (Hons.) Social Work and B.A. (Hons.) Business Economics which were started in 1995-96 and B.A. (Hons.) Applied Psychology which was introduced in 2007-08. The college has a distinction of offering some Commerce based courses like Human Resource Management (HRM) and Office Management and Secretarial Practice (OMSP) besides the Vocational Course like Functional Hindi (FH) to the students of BA (Programme). The college is privileged to have WUS Health Centre in its premises to look after the health care needs of students of Delhi University and its employees. The College is situated near upcoming Metro station which will soon be operational.

Under the capacity expansion plan initiated by GNCTD, the University has selected our college as one of the Regional-cum-Study Centres to facilitate undergraduate teaching under Personal Contact Programme (PCP) for School of Open Learning (SOL) students. The college is also one of the Centres for teaching to the girl students under Non Collegiate Women Education Board (NCWEB), University of Delhi.

Our College has also been selected as one of the 12 Centres spread all over India by Rajiv Gandhi National Institute of Youth Development, Ministry of Youth Affairs & Sports, Tamil Nadu which offers one year Post Graduate Diploma in Youth Development (PGDYD) under the coordinatorship of Dr. S.S Chawla.

## III. ADMISSION INFORMATION

All the candidates seeking admission to the Undergraduate (UG) Courses, based on merit (for which there is no entrance exam) in different colleges of the University of Delhi (DU), are required to register online at the following UG admission portal at http://ug.du.ac.in.

The college shall be following the admission procedure given in Bulletin of Information for Admission in Undergraduate Courses 2017-18. Interested Students are therefore advised to go through Delhi University Bulletin of Information 2017-18 carefully before applying for admission to a course in the college.

- Admission to all courses is based on University of Delhi guidelines regarding qualifying examination, minimum eligibility conditions and admission procedure; and further subject to the confirmation by the University.
- 2. Admission will be made on merit basis through cut-offs displayed on the notice board of the college as per the University schedule and guidelines. No individual information will be sent. The college reserves the right to make any correction in the list superseding the earlier.
- 3. A candidate must have passed Senior Secondary School Certificate Examination (class XII) of the CBSE obtaining minimum marks as specified for each course or an examination recognized as equivalent there to or as per the specified qualifying examination for the purpose of admission. Candidates seeking admission on the basis of Equivalence Criteria and Grade Conversion will be considered strictly as per University Rules as indicated in the Admission Brochure 2017-18.
- 4. A candidate can take admission only in one course in one college at any given time. In case a student wishes to withdraw/cancel the admission in a course/college, the candidate should approach the college where the admission is taken. Only after the college cancels the admission of a candidate, the candidate can proceed to take admission in other course/college. Admission fee will be refunded to the candidate as per the college/University rules.

#### 5. Reservation of Seats (Other than OBC)

Admission under categories **Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes** (22½% of the total numbers of seats are reserved for candidates belonging to SC/ST (15% for SC and 7½% for ST) interchangeable (if necessary). It is a statutory obligation to fill all seats reserved for SC/ST candidates; **Differently Abled Persons/PwD** (5% for those having minimum 40% physical disabilities). Admission to the children/widows of Officers and Men of the **Armed Forces**, including para-military personnel, killed/Ex-servicemen disabled in action (5% seats are reserved for CW candidates course-wise). Up to 5% seats are reserved course wise for wards of Kashmiri Migrants and Foreign Students or as advised by the University. All such admissions will be done as per University guidelines published in Bulletin of Information 2017-18 with follow up changes as applicable from time to time.

For admission under the reserved categories of Kashmiri Migrants/Children of War Widows, the admission process shall continue to be centralized and conducted at the University level by the office of Deputy Registrar, Academic. All those candidates who are covered under any of the categories of reservation for children of War Widows/Kashmiri Migrants must register separately online if they wish to be considered for any other category (Gen./OBC/SC/ST/PwD).

**Note**: Eligible students of SC/ST, OBC, PwD etc. should submit their scholarship form for the academic year by February for processing scholarship to SC/ST, OBC, PwD etc. each year.

- **6. OBC Reservations (Non-Creamy Layer):** 27% seats will be reserved for the candidates belonging to the OBC.
  - 6.1 The OBC candidates shall be given a relaxation in the minimum eligibility in the qualifying examination and in minimum eligibility (if any) in the admission entrance test to the extent of 10% of the minimum eligibility marks prescribed for the General Category candidates. For example, if the minimum eligibility for admission to a course is 50% for the General Category candidates, the minimum eligibility for the OBC candidates will be 45% i.e. (50% less 10% of 50%).
  - 6.2 All those OBC candidates who meet the minimum eligibility marks in the qualifying examination and the minimum eligibility marks (if any) in the entrance test shall be eligible for admission in the order of their merit, keeping in view the availability of seats reserved for them.
  - 6.3 The OBC candidate belonging to the 'Non-Creamy Layer' as mentioned in the certificate in his/her own name and whose caste appears in the Central List of the OBCs only shall be eligible to be which has to be considered for admission under the OBC Category.

Note: The merit list for the general category seats will comprise of all the candidates in the order of merit. No one will be excluded from the same. In other words, it will also include SC/ST/OBC candidates, if they come in general merit. A candidate cannot be excluded from the general category merit list just because s/he belongs to SC/ST/OBC. Such a candidate is entitled to be considered under the general as well as the reserved category. Admission to open category seats will be strictly in the order of merit without excluding SC/ST/OBC candidates.

Candidates seeking admission under SC/ST/OBC category should have certificate in their own names only.

#### 7. Admission on the Basis of Sports and Extra-Curricular Activities

The college encourages students with background of sports and extra-curricular activities. Not more than 5% of the total seats are available for such admissions (subject-wise), except in the courses where there is an admission test or centralized admission.

**7.1 Admission under Sports Quota:** Candidates have to apply online on the University of Delhi portal. Admission will be done strictly as per University guidelines vide letter no.Aca.1/086/UG/Adm.-Procedure-Schedule/2017-18/68 dated 25.05.2017.

The guidelines stipulated are as follows:

#### I. Super Category: Direct Admission without Sports Trials

- 1. Olympic Games by the International Olympic Committee (IOC)
- 2. World Championship / World Cup by International Sports Federations (ISFs)
- 3. Commonwealth Games by Commonwealth Games Federation (CGF)

- 4. Asian Games by Olympic Council of Asia (OCA)
- 5. Asian Championships by International Sports Federations (ISFs)
- 6. South Asian Games (SAG) by South Asian Sports Council (SASC)
- 7. Paralympic Games by International Paralympic Committee (IPC)

#### II. Admission on the basis of Sports Trials

- 1. Sports Certificate of Invitational / Memorial / Open / Prize Money League / Ranking competitions will not be considered.
- 2. Only the highest Sports Certificate will be considered for Marking.
- 3. Sports Certificate of **the only preceding three years** will be considered from 22<sup>nd</sup> May 2014 to 21<sup>st</sup> May 2017.
- 4. Applicant should **upload Self-Attested copy** of Sports Certificate.
- 5. The level of competency of the applicant will be determined for those who have achieve distinction only during the preceding three year in those Games/Sports recognized by AIU/MYAS in which interuniversity competitions are held and preference given by the colleges.

College reserves the right to change the number and nature of specific game/sport and their respective position/event/weight category depending upon the availability of applicants at any stage of addmission.

For other details and Sports Trials, Students are advised to see the DU Sports Council/College website and also get in touch with Dr. K. K. Sharma, (Convenor, Sports Committee).

Note: An undertaking shall be given by the finally selected sportsperson on Judicial Stamp paper of Rs. 100/- that "s/he will play for college and university, all the 3 years during his/her undergraduate course" at the time of admission.

- **7.2 Admission under Extra-Curricular Activities (ECA):** The following guidelines for admission to various undergraduate courses on the basis of Extra Curricular Activities (ECA) will be followed by all concerned:
- 1. Candidates seeking admission under ECA category shall Register Online on Delhi University admission portal.
- 2. The charges for register will be Rs.100/- in addition to charges for (UR/OBC/SC/ST/PwD) registration.

#### 3. Trials will be held at two levels: (i) Preliminary Trials (ii) Final Trials

- i. The date/dates for the Preliminary/Final trials shall be notified and displayed on the College website and also displayed on the College Notice Board.
- ii. The candidate seeking benefit of any participation/winning certificate must submit evidence of having participated in the concerned activity during the last three years (May 22, 2014 to May 21, 2017).
- iii. Weightage will be given to the certificates of winners/ participants at International, National, State, Zonal and School level, and Trials are as follows: Certificates: 25% Trials: 75%. The certificates to be considered should not be more than three years old.
- iv. All candidates shall be allowed to appear at the preliminary level only once in an event. Any request for second chance will not be permitted.
- v. If a candidate wishes to appear in the preliminary round for more than one activity, pre-conditions would remain the same.
- 4. The list of the short listed candidates for Final Trials will be notified on the college website and also displayed on the notice board of the college.
- 5. Not more than 15% concession in academic merit vis-à-vis general category candidates (last cut-off or 5<sup>th</sup> cut-off whichever is earlier) may be given for admission to specific courses (subject to the minimum eligibility of the course).
- 6. The University will video-graph the events and maintain records. The Trials for admission under ECA category shall be conducted by the University ECA Committee.
- 7. The certificate will be evaluated only for the students who qualify for the final trial. They have to carry all the relevant certificate in original and self-attested photo copy for evaluation at the time of addmission.
- 8. Any candidate submitting false/fake certificate will be debarred from admission to any programme in any college for three years. If a candidate seeks addmission on the basis of false/fake certificates, not only will the admissions be cancelled, a FIR may also be registered against him/her.

#### 8. Documents Required for Admission:

(i) Marks-Sheet (class XII); (ii) Original Provisional Certificate (class XII); (iii) Date of Birth (class X); (iv) Marks-Sheet (class X); (v) Character Certificate (recent and original); (vi) Aadhar Card (copy); (vii) Address Proof(Ration Card/ Electricity/Telephone Bill); (viii) ID Proof (Voter Id); (ix) Migration/Transfer Certificate (wherever necessary); (x) Certificate of Caste/Disability/OBC (wherever necessary); (xi) Undertaking, if applicable; (xii) ECA/Sports Certificates; (xiii) 5 recent passport size photographs; (xiv) 2 Photographs (duly verified by Head of Institute last attended and issuing authority for Sports category; (xv) College forms (Anti Ragging Affidavit of (a) student and (b) parents, Admission, Library/Identity Card, Undertaking); (xvi) The copy of a cancelled Cheque.

**N.B.** One set of self-attested photocopies of all certificates are required along with original documents at the time of admission. A student shall not have a claim for admission if s/he fails to produce the required documents or deposit the fee as per the notified time schedule.

Please note, if any false attestation/falsified records are detected at any stage, the concerned student shall be debarred from attending any course in the college for the next five years; and in addition, a criminal case under relevant sections of IPC (viz. 470,471,474 etc.) will be initiated against the candidate to subject him/her to the requisite criminal proceedings as per law.

**9. Migration:** No migration from other institutions, whatsoever may be the reason, will be entertained in the first year.

- **10**. **Gap Period Admission:** Gap year(s) would be no bar for the purpose of admission to the undergraduate courses. The college shall strictly follow the University guidelines with respect to gap year policy. A Gap period affidavit (**Annexure 5**) must be furnished by the concerned student.

# IV. THE CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM

University of Delhi introduced the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) at the undergraduate level w.e.f. academic session 2015-16. The CBCS provides an opportunity for the students to choose courses from the prescribed courses comprising core, elective/minor or skill based courses. The courses shall be evaluated following the grading system. Every student enrolled for an undergraduate degree has to study a number of Courses like the Core, Elective (Discipline Specific Elective, Generic Elective, Dissertation), Ability Enhancement and Skill Enhancement.

- **1.** Core Course: This is a compulsory course and must be studied by every candidate who has taken admission to a particular programme.
- 2. Elective Course: This course provides an extended scope by enabling the student an exposure to some other discipline/subject/domain thereby nurturing the candidate's proficiency & skill. Student is allowed to choose a course from a pool of courses.
  - (a) If this Elective course is offered by the main discipline/subject of study (which can be interdisciplinary in nature) it shall be referred to as **Discipline Specific Elective (DSE).**
  - (b) If it is from an unrelated discipline it is called **Generic Elective (GE) or Interdisciplinary Elective**Course.
  - (c) **Dissertation/Project**: An elective course designed to acquire special/advance knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to a project work, and a candidate studies such a course on his own with an advisory support by a teacher/faculty member is called dissertation/project.
- **3. Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC):** The Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) aim at knowledge enhancement, such courses **are mandatory across all programmes of study**.
- **4. Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC):** Skill Enhancement Courses are a type of AEC Courses but are aimed at providing hands-on-training, competencies, skills to students. These courses **may be chosen from a pool of courses** designed to provide value-based and/or skill-based knowledge to students.
  - **Please Note (1):** The CBCS system is subject to modification by the University of Delhi from time to time and also according to the requirements of each college. In case a student faces any problem or difficulty with the different courses under CBCS, he/she should get in touch with the teacher in charge of his/her programme of study.
  - (2): A list of Generic Elective Courses offered by every Department shall be displayed on the students' notice board at the start of each semester.

# **B.A.** (Hons.) Social Work

Dr. B.M.Dash (Teacher-in-charge)

Social work is a professional course introduced by University of Delhi in 1995, our college being the first to initiate this course. Social work education is comprised of class room teaching and field work practicum. Class room teaching is directed towards familiarizing students with principles and skills required for social work intervention and developing students' personality through inculcation of democratic and humanitarian values. Field work practicum involves organisational as well as community based practice whereby students learn to work with welfare, development and empowered oriented programmes. This course is designed to provide young students with in-depth understanding of emerging societal concerns, issues of vulnerable groups, appropriate programme planning and implementations.

After completion of this course, social work students would have job opportunities both in government and non-government sectors in varied settings like schools, hospitals, corporate, legal system like family courts &Crime Against Women cell. Students can choose to make his/her career in family and child welfare, education, health care, youth welfare, rural and urban development, environment and research. This is an ideal course for those who

wish to take up challenges to improve the lives of marginalized sections of the society by responding to their needs of human rights & social justice and become part of development process.

**Admission Procedure:** Admission to this course will be made on merit basis, through cut-offs displayed on the web as well as notice board of the college as per the University of Delhi guidelines.

#### COMPONENTS OF FIELD WORK PRACTICUM

- **A. Observation Visits:** Students will be given an opportunity to visit and observe various agency/ community setting in order to know about the initiatives of governmental and non-governmental organizations towards social problems.
- **B. Orientation Programme:** Three-days orientation programme will be organized at the commencement of the course of the semester-1 of first year and at the beginning of semester-3 and semester-5 of second and third years respectively before starting concurrent filed work. Orientation visits to welfare agencies/communities will be an integral part of the orientation programme.
- Concurrent Field Work: Concurrent field work will be required to be done simultaneously with class-room teaching of theory papers from the very beginning of all the semesters (both odd and even) of all three years and shall continue till the preparation leave before commencement of the examinations. Two days in a week will be allotted to the students to perform concurrent field work. A minimum of 15 hours (including report writing) per week of concurrent field work will be required for each student.
- **D. Rural Camp:** Five-day rural camp will be organized for the students of semester-5 & 6 of third year (preferably for semester-5 students) to provide exposure to the students about the socio-economic, political and cultural situations and problems of rural life.
- **E. Block Field Work:** At the end of semester-6 of third year, students will be required to undergo fourweek block field work training in a social welfare agency or project in or outside Delhi. It is treated more as pre-employment experience. Successful completion of block field work is mandatory before the B.A. (Hons.) Social Work degree can be awarded.
- **F. Skill Development Workshops:** The skill development workshop is a platform in which values, principles, methods, techniques, tools etc. are translated into practice skills, i.e. 'learning by doing'.
  - **Note:** Eighty percent (80%) attendance in the concurrent field work and seventy five percent (75%) attendance in theory classes is compulsory. If the required hours of field work and its components

are not completed by any student by the end of the semester in which he/she is studying, an assessment of the performance of the student with a 'fail' recommendation will be issued by the College Supervisor/Instructor. After receiving 'fail' recommendation in the field work assessment, the student will be deemed to have failed in both theory and field work.

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### **B.A.** (Hons.) Geography

Dr. Monica Ahlawat (Teacher-in-charge)

Geography is concerned with providing scientific description and interpretation about the variable character of earth surface. Geography is fundamentally a holistic discipline in that it studies things and events in their total context. Geographers study human habitat and man's interrelations with environment. Due to its interdisciplinary nature, the subject is gaining popularity especially when the world is in the grip of problems like climate change, environmental degradation and depletion, food insecurity, regional and socio-economic inequalities and socio-cultural transformations. The discipline's scope gives an advantage to the students providing diverse career options. The new techniques of data acquisition and analysis like Remote Sensing and Geographical Information System (GIS) have further widened up the career options. In addition to the class room teaching and spatial technologies practical knowledge, the Department of Geography also organizes a field trip to enrich the understanding of the subject.

Field Trip will be organized by the Department of Geography for the students of semester IVfor the partial fulfillment of paper 10: Field Work and Research Methodology (Practical). The field trip is compulsory for all the students of Semester IV.

**Student Activities**: A programme titled **Bhu-Chetna** (Geo-awareness) is organized for conducting a number of intercollege competitions such as Geo-quiz, debate and essay writing etc. A running inter-college trophy **Aryabhatta** is awarded to the best debating team.

### **B.A.** (Hons.) Economics

Dr. Sonia Aggarwal (Teacher-in-charge)

Economics has been and continues to be an extremely popular choice of course for students pursuing the bachelor degree. Economics is the study of how economic activities are organized by societies, governments, businesses, households, and individuals by allocating their scarce resources to meet unlimited needs in the perspective of sustainable human development. Economists are well known for advising the government on economic issues, formulating policies for the central bank and at fiscal and the welfare front. It also offers a tool with which to approach questions about the desirability of a particular financial investment opportunity, the benefits and costs of alternative choices and the likely impacts of public policies.

The complementary study of econometrics, the primary quantitative method used in the discipline, enables students to become critical consumers of statistically based arguments about numerous public and private issues rather than passive recipients. Such knowledge enables them to ask whether the evidence on the desirability of a particular policy, claims about the likely future path of the economy, or other issues are really compelling or whether it simply sounds good but falls apart upon closer inspection.

In this discipline students learn conceptual and empirical models of behavior to predict responses to changes in policy and market conditions and how statistical and mathematical analysis are used to investigate these changes.

Dr. Jaya Verma (Teacher-in-charge)

The discipline, at an academic level, satisfies our craving to fathom our past, the trajectories of the growth of human societies across the world and at the same time helps understand systematically the genesis and causes of many of our contemporary problems. History is a popular subject for competitive examinations given its seamless cohesion with many social science disciplines. Departures in historiographical work in the last half a century have shifted the focus of discourse from documenting the plethora of ruling dynasties and their historical contexts to a more complex paradigm of exploring the historical changes in social, economic and cultural domains. This has made historical enquiry an enriching exercise in analyzing historical questions through interdisciplinary enquiry and exploration. For example, Environmental history and Historical geography bring the disciplines of History and Geography together, analyses of Political systems and state structures in the past bring History and Political Science together and historical engagements with social issues like caste, gender, education and suchlike necessitates some knowledge of Sociology and social theory. History has also emerged as a foundation stone for more specialized professional courses related to Archaeology, Museology, Heritage and Conservation of Historical monuments and artifacts. Careers such as these are challenging but nonetheless provide ample opportunities to contribute to the society and help make this world a better place to live.

#### **University Examination Fee**

Fees on account of University Examination will be charged on the dates notified on the notice board. Names of students who fail to make payment of University/College dues up to the last date as notified shall be removed from the college rolls. However, such students may be re-admitted at the discretion of the Principal on a written request along with requisite readmission fee in each case as required.

#### Refund of Fee on Withdrawal/Cancellation of Admission or Migration

A student wishing to withdraw his/her name from the college must do so formally in writing. S/he is liable to pay all fees and other dues until his/her name is formally withdrawn. Identity Card and Library Tickets must be surrendered and other dues be cleared at the time of withdrawal from the college failing which a penalty as decided by the College will be charged.

If a student applies for withdrawal of admission at any stage, fee will be refunded as per the University guidelines.

#### **Student Aid Fund**

Deserving students may apply for limited aid to meet their tuition fee or for the purchase of books etc. A Text Book Library is also run under this scheme, which provides books on loan basis.

#### Fee Concession/waiver

- 1. Deserving students can also apply in the college for fee concession.
- 2. Students belonging to the Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Classes and PwD are awarded scholarship as per the guidelines of Government of States and the Centre. Such students are required to apply to the Secretary, Scheduled Castes/Scheduled Tribes and Backward Classes Board, Government of India or other such bodies on prescribed form immediately after joining the college.
- 3. The student with physical disabilities pursing a course in college shall be exempted from payment of fees, including examination fee and other University fees, except admission fee and identity card fee.
- 4. Children of Army Officers/Jawans killed or disabled are also entitled for fee concession as per University guidelines.

## VII. COLLEGE INFRASTRUCTURE

#### **Computer Labs**



The college is well equipped with IT facilities including four computer labs, internet access and multimedia projectors. The college has high-speed internet connectivity with 100 mbps fiber optics as well as broadband connections. Computer Labs are equipped with two 10KVA and six 5KVA online UPSs for power backup. The college has installed hardware Firewall for internet security and authentication purpose. The complete college campus is Wi-Fi enabled.

The college has established an IT Hub including 80 computers and 2 servers with latest configuration. The college received 833 laptops from the University. These were distributed to first year students and faculty members.

In order to improve IT infrastructure and teaching methodology, the college has installed 27 multimedia projectors provided by Delhi University in the classrooms with 20 numbers of laptops to teach students through it. Computers

Labs are with Projectors and interactive boards.

With CCTVs installed at important points, the security arrangements are updated and ragging is checked. The college has a website, **www.drbrambedkarcollege.ac.in**, which is regularly updated. Students should regularly see the college website to update themselves about the important notices and activities of the college.

#### Library

The College Library is housed in a separate building and has about 37,540 books and is fully computerized with online facilities. The college presently subscribes to around 50 periodicals (except complementary) and can add



to this List on the recommendation of Teachers. Books are provided to economically weaker students through the Students Aid Fund (SAF). The library has created a space for 100 readers and separate air-conditioned space for teachers. The library has Wi-Fi enabled air-conditioned cabins, digital pocket player, and text to speech converter and braille books for the benefit of EOC Students. Online facilities like OPAC, N-List (e-journals) through INFLIBNET are also available in

the Library. There is a separate section on Ambedkar, Gandhi, Nehru and other such personalities. A cabin is also provided for the exclusive use of differently abled persons. 'Sugamya Pustakalay' facility has been started for 'Divyangjan'. The Library is online and a link is provided on the college website. Since 2005 the Library is fully computerized and Libsys software is used for acquisition, cataloguing and circulation of books. Plagiarism checking facility is also available.

Library is a very popular place for students. It is open to all the college students on all the working days. Students can become member free of cost by following proper procedure and getting Library cards issued in their names. The students are expected to follow below mentioned rules and regulations while using the Library facility of the college.

- Silence must be strictly observed in the Library. All Cell phones must be switched off while in the library.
- No reader shall write damage or make any mark upon any reading material.
- The reader shall be responsible for any damage done to the book or other property of the Library. S/he will be required to replace such book or other property damaged or pay the value of the same.
- The facility for depositing the usual personal belongings at the property counter is provided only for those readers who are actually present in the Library.
- Readers should not deposit bags containing cash/ other valuable articles such as mobiles, jewelry, etc. at the property counter. The college will not be responsible for any such loss.
- The Library membership will be valid till s/he gets the roll number for appearing in University exam.
- Before leaving the book issue counter, the reader shall satisfy her/himself whether the book is in sound
  physical condition; otherwise s/he will be liable for any damage to the book and its replacement by a
  sound copy of latest edition.

**N.B.** Students are advised and encouraged to give their E-mail IDs for accessing E-resources under N-LIST - a facility available in our College.

#### **Auditorium**

The college has a fully air conditioned auditorium with a capacity of about 250 persons. The auditorium is equipped with audio-visual facilities such as floor mikes, hand mikes, a computer, a screen and a projector. It is used for holding seminars, workshops, lectures and debates for the benefit of students and the faculty.

#### Canteen

Canteen is an important place for students to sit, interact and discuss things with each other in an informal manner. The college canteen provides the students with a variety of eateries. It has adequate seating space of around 100 persons with a separate seating area for the staff. The college makes every effort that quality food is provided to students at affordable prices.

Power Back-up: The college has full power back-up through two 125 KVA and 62 KVA generator sets.

## VIII. IN-HOUSE UTILITY SERVICES

**Photostat:** A Stationery-cum-Photostat Shop is available in the college and provides Xeroxing facility to students at reasonable rates.

**Bank:** The Oriental Bank of Commerce is situated in college premises. It has a fully computerized branch and provides banking facilities to the teaching and non-teaching staff, students of the college and residents of this area. The ATM facility of this bank is also available on campus.

**Medical Facility:** WUS center of Delhi University (East Campus) is housed in the college residential complex to cater to the medical requirements of teachers, staff and students. Though first-aid facility is available free of cost to the college, students are advised to avail medical facilities of the University Health Centre by accepting its membership offered on payment of a very nominal one time yearly fee of Rs.150 through the college.

Open Gymnasium, Yoga, Meditation Hut & Acupressure Park: In order to promote the holistic development of the students and imbibing in them the love for nature along with creating an environment for them to destress, the college has created Open Gymnasium, Yoga, Meditation hut & Acupressure Park with 17 work out machines spread over 1800 sq.ft. area. The Yoga & Meditation Hut is made of bamboo and there is 100 meter long Acupressure Path based on the principles of reflexology. The Gym has been very successful and hopefully would help enhancing the physical and mental health of college community.

**Girls Medical & Counselling Room:** The College, in its Teaching Block-I has created Medical & Counselling room for girls with a view to promote the physical as well as psychological aspects of their well-being. Efforts will be made to arrange to provide medical/counselling on a regular basis to look after their physical/mental health needs.

**Student Friendly e-Facilities: O**nline fee submission facility is available on the college portal. College also provides economic support through scholarships for economically weaker sections, book bank facility, Earn While You Learn for the empowerments of weaker section of the society.

# IX. LEARNING BEYOND CLASSROOM: TOWARDS A HOLISTIC DEVELOPMENT

Although Classroom learning is a vital component of students' life, nevertheless, the college has chosen overall development of young minds as its mission. To this end different departments organize academic and extracurricular activities like quiz, debates, presentations, writing competitions etc. at the inter-college level. Both the English and the Hindi departments have separately instituted a running trophy each for inter-college debate competitions. The Department of Economics organizes an annual inter-college quiz competition Jigyasa for their running trophy Kautilya.

Departments also organize various seminars, workshops and lectures inviting eminent academicians and experts from different fields, with a view to enabling the students to interact with them, and getting a good insight of the work/professional sector for which they are preparing themselves. Intellectual stimulation apart, interdisciplinary cultural and sporting activities etc., intersperse the academic curricula to channelize the creative and physical talent and potential of students. There are ample opportunities for them to compete at the inter-college, intracollege and national levels.

- (i) Cultural Activities: The Cultural Society is one of the most active and vibrant societies. It works with a vision to attain the epitome of cultural excellence, gives its students the guided exposure to various art forms including dance, music and drama. Students excel in their respective fields and win accolade in intra and inter-college competitions. The cultural society works through sub-societies like Dance, Music, Creativity and Fashion societies. These operate in tandem with the common goal of exploring talent amongst students. Throughout the year our students work to excel in their respective fields and win accolade in intra and inter-college competitions. Our Annual Cultural festival 'Chetna Exuberance' is one such event which gives a platform to such hidden talents. This year Chetna Cultural Festival saw participation from over 28 colleges with around 1000 online registrations and participation in 20 different events. (Convenor, Dr. D.K. Pandey).
- (ii) Games and Sports: Any activity that inculcates discipline, physical power and agility is obviously important for young growing minds. Making sports activities and games a way of life would immensely increase the intellectual output and prepare the person to work well even under pressure. The college boasts of a spacious ground and our students have been competing at the university, national and international levels and winning Ist & IInd positions consistently. The activities include cross-country, athletics, archery, soft ball, swimming, volley ball, baseball, table tennis, chess, badminton, football, kho-kho etc. The college has developed its basketball, football and netball field. (Dr. K.K. Sharma, Convenor)
- (iii) Academic/Cultural Activity: The College actively participated in Antradhvani -15, the academic and cultural Fest. of University of Delhi in 2015 and awarded commendation prize for its stole on good practices from Sri Sri Ravi Shankar ji. The college organised Abhivyakti in February 2016, in which different departments presented there academic activities and achievement. It provided students a platform to portray their academic skills. The college also celebrated the birth anniversary of Bharat Ratna Baba Saheb Dr.Bhim Rao Ambedkar, thereby motivated students to get in touch with visionary thoughts through special lectures, workshops, seminars and essay competition.
- (iv) NCC (Boys and Girls, Army and Naval Wings): Under the guidance and motivation of the dedicated teachers, ANOs and caretaker, students opting for NCC are actively participating in various sports including horse riding, rock climbing, mountaineering, para sailing and rafting etc. The basic purpose behind this endeavour is to build a healthy, disciplined and committed team of NCC cadets. The overwhelming participation of our cadets in Prime Minister's Rally and Republic Day Parade and a

number of camps is well recognized by the NCC unit office. The team of the faculty in-charge of the NCC organizes annual NCC festival with the name 'Lakshya' every year besides printing out an annual magazine with the same title. Yoga training to our cadets and the unfurling of national flag on the eve of Republic Day and Independence Day are important features of the college NCC curriculum (Lt. (Dr.) Rajbir Vats, Associate NCC Officer Dr. Sangeeta Sharma, Caretaker & Sub/Lt. (Dr.) Arvind Kumar Yadav, Associate NCC Officer).

- (v) Academic Development Society for students: The activities of this Society for the academic session 2015-16 included holding of an inter-college seminar for students titled 'Delhi University students' Leadership: Emerging Opportunities and Challenges', a special talk on 'Distinguished Traits Possessed by Left-Handers'. The Society also conducted a two-week long Entrepreneurial Development Programme in collaboration with the Ministry of Micro, Small and Medium Enterprises, Govt. of India, which trained the students on how to set up their own business enterprise (Dr. Navin Kumar, Convenor).
- (vi) College Magazine: The College publishes its annual magazine *Chetna* by inviting articles on a wide range of issues from students, helping them to cultivate writing and literary tastes and to encourage creative articulation. The magazine provides a forum in which they can express their ideas in their respective fields of interest. The youthful spirit seeks and defines itself by articulating and responding to the world around (Convenor: Dr. S. S. Chawla).
- (vii) Research Promotion: The College has launched an International Multidisciplinary Bi-annual journal 'ACADEMIA' in Social Sciences, Humanities and Languages. The Journal has an ISSN Number and may be considered as a landmark during the Silver Jubilee Year of the College. It is an outcome of the collective efforts of the college teaching staff. Contributors to this Journal include faculty members, leading researchers and also students. Recently the College has also brought out a monograph. Faculty members have also completed innovation projects in different areas of research.
- (viii) NSS: National Service Scheme (NSS) aims at inculcating the spirit of voluntary work among students and teachers through sustained community interactions and development. It brings the academic elite closer to the society. Presently the College NSS unit has 250 volunteers. The activities of this unit included 'Gram Jagriti Yojna' a three-day visit to Banpur, a small village in District Lalitpur, U.P. A variety of activities including Awareness Lectures, Cleanliness, Women Safety, building mathematical ability, self-defence for women besides conducting a socio-economic survey of the village life were organised. NSS unit also organized 'Rashtriya Ekta Utsav' under which Rangoli, Debate, Article writing competitions were conducted on the themes of National Integration, Harmony and Role of Youth. A workshop for school students was also organized to create awareness among girls regarding admission and social and health issues. Besides, students were made aware of the National Digital Literary Mission. On the occasion of National Youth Day, a Quiz competition was also organized (Dr. Ravindra Singh, Convenor).
- (ix) The Gender Sensitization Committee organized its programme/workshop 'Gender Bender'. It also organized Poster Making & Slogan Writing Competitions. The following talks were organized (i) Impact of Non-Communicable Diseases (ii) Gender Sensitization (iii) Women Empowerment and Safety (Dr. Sangeeta Sharma, Convenor).
- (x) Placement Cell: The Placement Committee successfully organized the placement drive of well-known companies on our campus. It also organized talks on 'Writing Professional CV' and 'How to prepare for GD and Interviews' for the benefit of students (Dr. Lalit Kumar, Convenor).
- (xi) Enabling Equal Opportunity Cell: As per Delhi Universities guidelines PwD category students are admitted in different courses run by the college. The college makes every effort to ensure that the classes of PwD students are made accessible so as to cause minimum inconvenience to such students. All the PwD students are given facilities as per guidelines provided by Delhi University. A society named 'SAHYOG' has been constituted in which all the interested college students are enrolled as members with an aim to guide, help and cooperate with the PwD students for their better academic and co-curricular performance (Dr. Om Mishra, Convenor).

- (xii) English Language Proficiency Course (ELPC) and Short Term Add-on Computer Course: On the demand of students the College offers English Language Proficiency Course (ELPC) designed by University of Delhi. There is also a Computer Add-on Course for computer literacy and awareness.
- (xiii) Garden/Eco-Club: The Garden/Eco Club of the college works for increasing green cover and sensitizing students about the needs of protecting and promoting our environment. The main activities of the Club include workshops, debates, dramatics, and other interactive programmes related with environment in which students participate with zeal and interest. Under the aegis of the Eco Club, the Herbal and the Rose gardens developed during the last three years are now best known in the University and televised nationally. The college has also installed Solar Panel and Paper Recycling Unit in the premises. (Dr K. K. Sharma Convenor, Eco Club and; Dr. Lalit Kumar Convenor, Gardening Committee).
- (xiv) Green Cadets: Green Cadets is a programme through which the college aims to build up a team of students who would be trained as socially committed action-oriented resource persons for spreading awareness, promoting a love for nature, and directly working for an efficient management of environment and natural resources and their further sustainability within the college and outside. The training module of the Green Cadets includes awareness sessions, skill building workshops, movie screening and practical training programmes.
- (xv) College Counselling Centre: The Counselling Centre's primary purpose is to provide psychological support as you pursue your academic and personal goals, and to enhance the quality of your experience. One of the services provided to students is career counselling. To cater to special needs of Students from North-East and Abroad the college has established a separate cell which offers personalized counselling to such students (Dr. Richa Chaudhary, Convenor; North East/Foreign Students Advisor, Ms. N. Victoria Chanu, Convenor).
- (xvi) Red Ribbon Club: Red Ribbon is a society aimed at uniting the people in the common fight against the HIV/AIDS disease. The role of the Red Ribbon Club is to educate youth with correct, concise and adequate information and increase their level of awareness about HIV/AIDS/STI, sexuality and other related issues with the sensitization of the youth regarding care and support needs of PLWHA (people living with HIV/AIDS) and instill in them the spirit of helping and supporting the PLWHA, and reduce the stigma and discrimination against them. Key Areas of RRC are Vibrancy of youth; Sex & Sexuality pear Education, Voluntary Blood Donation. This committee organised three-day workshop on 'Sociological Perspective of HIV Aids' and related topics (Dr. Sangeeta Dhaor, Convenor).
- (xvii) Alumni Club: The College Alumni Club is a very vibrant body. It organizes and coordinates all alumni activities involving a large number of our students. The College has been acknowledging the efforts, talents and achievements of our Alumni by honoring them in Alumni Function held every year on the First Sunday of February. The college also releases an updated Directory of the former students (Dr. S. S. Chawla, Convenor).

#### **SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT:**

- (xviii) Life Skills Building Workshop/Activities for weaker section students including SC/ST Students: The College organizes special workshops/programmes to help SC/ST students in their academic enrichment, building life skills and empowering them with a sense of self-esteem. The college has been awarded UGC grants in the past for providing free of cost coaching and remedial classes and to equip them for competitive exams.
- (xix) Yoga Cell: This Committee organised a number of activities including Celebration of International Day of Yoga in which 570 NCC cadets from various DU Colleges and schools had participated. The college has also started imparting yoga training to all the students of the college. Yoga sessions are attended by the students every day from 7:45 A.M. 8:45 A.M. under the supervision of trained yoga instructor (Dr. Sangeeta Sharma, Convenor).

- (xx) College as an Instrument of Social Development: The College contributes a bit for women development through gender justice and economic empowerment. In the past, the NSS unit in collaboration with Jan Shiksha Sansthan, Ministry of Human Resource Development, Government of India remained engaged in imparting absolutely free of cost vocational training in dress-making (80 days), embroidery Hand & Machines (100 days) and Beauty Culture and Health Care (60 days) to about 100 women from weaker sections of the neighboring areas.
- (xxi) Digital India, National Digital Literacy Mission: The aim of the National Digital Literacy Mission (under the Ministry of Communications and Information Technology, Govt. of India) is to train and appoint student volunteers across colleges. (Coordinator, Dr. Sarla Devi Bhardwaj).
- (xxii) Anti-Tobacco Campaign: The entire college campus is a 'No Smoking Zone'. University of Delhi in collaboration with World Lung Foundation South Asia (WLF-SA) has undertaken a massive campaign involving students, teachers, non-teaching staff, vendors etc. to make University campus and its colleges, a Tobacco Free Zone. Following the same and under the guidance of University, the college has constituted an Anti-Tobacco Brigade amongst students for promoting tobacco free environment. The primary focus at the initial stage is on educational cum motivational campaigns, awareness generation camps, seminars and workshops, posters and slogan competitions, rallies, street plays etc. and enforcement of the existing Anti-Tobacco Laws (Dr. Arvind Yadav, Convenor).
- (xxiii) Swachhata Abhiyan Cell: The Swachhata Abhiyan Cell/Committee carried out two major cleanliness drives one as Special Week-Long Drive & second a day's drive, both with relatively greater zeal this year. It spread the awareness amongst the students and all associated with the college and made it a great success (Dr. R. P. Dwivedi, Convenor).
- (xxiv) The college has also been registered with GeM and PFMs to facilitate cashless economy and promote transparent purchase practices.

## X. CAMPUS LIFE: INFORMATION AND GUIDELINES

**Academic Session:** Students are advised to assemble in the Teaching Block on 19<sup>th</sup> July 2017 at 10.30 a.m. for Principal's Welcome Address and an Orientation Programme at 11.30 am. The academic session will commence on Thursday, 20<sup>th</sup> July 2017 at 8.50 a.m.

**Identity Card:** Every student of the college should contact the S.O. (Admin.) for his/her identity card. S/he is expected to carry it at all times while in the college and has to produce the same whenever required to do so by the authorized staff members of the college.

Attendance: Every student has to attend at least two-third of the total number of lectures/tutorials/ preceptorials and three-fourth of practical's held during the academic year. Field training is also compulsory in some professional courses. Students are advised to be regular throughout the year. In case of sickness, students are advised to submit their medical certificates in the college office immediately on the rejoining after recovery, failing which no medical certificate on grounds whatsoever will be entertained. Ordinarily, no relaxation in attendance is given to any student. Admit card may be issued as per the decision of the college. The college reserves the right to impose the critical minimum attendance percentage and follows the University guidelines. In case of shortage of attendance students will be treated as per the University guidelines.

**Examination Schedule:** The College will conduct the final semester examinations in the months of November/ December and April/May respectively (as per the University schedule/guidelines). The college reserves the right not to allow a student to appear in the University exams if one does not clear or fails to clear University and College dues. Such a student will automatically be disqualified for Principal's Trophy or the Best Student Award etc.

Internal Assessment: (Ordinance VIII-E): 25% of the maximum marks in each paper (theory and practical) will be assigned for internal assessment on a continual basis and the remaining 75% marks for Annual/Semester Univer-

sity Examination. Such an assessment is based on house examination or Class Test(s)/Quiz(s), assignment/tutorials/seminars/tests, and attendance as follows:

- 1. Out of the 25% marks for the internal assessment, 10% weightage is assigned to House Examinations (for the Annual Examination Scheme) and Class Test (s)/ Quiz (s) (for the Semester Examination Scheme) to be conducted by the college for all papers of all courses.
- 2. Each student shall be assessed on the basis of written assignment/tutorials/ project reports/ term papers/ seminars and this carries 10% weightage.
- 3. Weightage of Attendance is as follows: (i) 67% or more but less than 70% of the total lectures held, 1 mark; (ii) 70% or more but less than 75%, 2 marks; (iii) 75% or more but less than 80%, -3 marks; (iv) 80% or more but less than 85%, 4 marks; and (v) 85% and above- 5 marks.

#### **College Students' Council**

The college has a very dynamic and active Students' Council elected by the students themselves. Under the guidance of the faculty members, it organizes various activities of the college. The Committees of Staff Council nominate the Cultural and Sports Secretaries. One out of four posts – President, Vice President, Secretary and Joint Secretary – is reserved for girl student. All office bearers hold office till last day of academic session in normal course, provided they are not penalized by any disqualification during their term of office.

#### General Rules of Election to College Students' Council

The **Hon'ble Supreme Court** has already provided guidelines regarding Model Code of Conduct for DUSU and the College Students Council elections. The college will follow these guidelines for conducting Students' Council elections as under:

#### **Eligibility Criteria for Seeking Election**

- 1. The candidate must be enrolled in a regular, full-time course of the college.
- 2. Undergraduate students between 17 and 22 years of age as on the date of election/as per the University guidelines may contest the elections.
- 3. The candidate should in no event have any academic arrears in the year of contesting the election.
- 4. The candidate should have attained a minimum of 75% attendance.
- 5. The candidate must have paid all dues towards the college by the date of scrutiny of nomination forms.
- 6. The candidate shall have only one opportunity in all to contest for the post of office bearer.
- 7. The candidate should neither have a previous criminal record nor should have been subjected to any disciplinary proceedings/action by the college/University authorities.
- 8. The candidate should not possess any other ground which may be deemed as disqualification by the college and Model Code of Conduct of University Election.
- 9. Gap/readmitted students will be allowed to contest as per the University guidelines.

#### **Election Related Expenditure**

1. The maximum permitted limit of expenditure for a candidate shall be Rs. 5000/-.

Each candidate shall within two weeks of the declaration of results submit complete and audited
accounts to the college authorities. The college shall publish all audited accounts within two days
of the submission of such accounts through a suitable medium so that any member of the student

- body may freely examine the same.
- 3. The candidates are specially barred from utilizing funds from any sources other than voluntary contributions from the students' body.
- 4. The election of the candidate will be nullified in the event of any non-compliance or in the event of any excessive expenditure.

#### Ban on Collection of Funds and Seeking Sponsorship

Students of the college including sports persons, office bearers of Students' Council and Academic Societies are not authorized to collect any money or seek sponsorship directly or indirectly from a company or public in any manner on behalf of the college. Any violation of this rule by a student will be treated as breach of discipline and shall attract severe punishment including removal from the elected post and/or expulsion from the college and/or debarring from University exam etc. For further changes and clarifications see University guidelines.

### XI. DISCIPLINE

- (A) The college is well known for maintaining discipline which has been especially appreciated by parents of girl students. The Proctorial Board/Joint Consultative Committee mainly functions to promote a healthy atmosphere and calm environment in the college. Students should note that the following aspects of conduct will be regarded as breach of discipline or interference in the normal functioning of the college and shall be liable for appropriate action:
  - Negligence towards assigned tasks and class work;
  - Causing disturbance to a class or listening loud music or shouting outside the class room and loitering in the college premises;
  - Defiance to teachers or any of college authorities or any disorderly behaviour;
  - Misconduct in the classroom, causing damage to furniture or equipment or any other college property;
  - Inciting others to create trouble, teasing, using language of insubordination;
  - Smoking in the college premises;
  - Practicing ragging in any form whatsoever;
  - Forming a Society without permission of the Principal and collecting money from the fellow students;
  - Use of mobile phone inside the teaching blocks/class rooms/Principal's office and listening to the music aloud; and for recording taking photos in College premises without permission.
  - Any other act included in the list by the Discipline Committee/Proctorial Board/Principal from time to time.
  - Physical assault, or threat to use physical force against any student, teaching and non-teaching staff.
  - Attempt at bribing or corruption in any manner;

- Willful destruction of college property;
- Creating ill-will or intolerance on religious or communal ground;
- Causing disruption in any manner of the academic functioning of the College;
- Students are advised not to misuse social media.

If a student violates any of the rules and breaks the discipline, action may involve warning and/ or fine and/or suspension from classes or library or even debarring from the examination or as prescribed in the University ordinances or as decided by the Proctorial Board/Principal/University in the light of Ordinance XV (B) and Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal Act 2013 of the rules of the University of Delhi.

With regard to issues of indiscipline, ragging and sexual harassment, the college shall follow the University ordinances in letter and spirit. A brief summary of these ordinances is given hereunder:

## In addition, the College will ensure Maintenance of Discipline among Students as required under (Ordinance XV-B).

- Principal of the college shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over students in the college as may be necessary for the proper conduct of the Institution. He may exercise his authority through, or delegate authority to, some of the teachers in the college as he may specify for these purposes.
- At the time of admission, every student shall be required to sign a declaration that on admission s/he submits himself/herself to the disciplinary jurisdiction of the authority of the college.

NB: Causing harassment in the name of Holi will attract disciplinary action under University Ordinance XV-B, Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal Act 2013and XV-E

#### (B) Ragging: Prohibited by Hon'ble Supreme Court

The Hon'ble Supreme Court of India vide D. No. 370/04/XI-A dated 26/02/09 has held that "Ragging in any form is a human rights abuse". Among the various forms that ragging may assume, the following may be chiefly noted:

- 1. Ragging comprises activities like introduction, teasing, terror, harassment, cruelty, fear and physical and mental torture or display of noisy, disorderly conduct or playing of practical jokes on junior students whether by words spoken or written or by an act which has the effect of teasing.
- 2. It also means indulging in rowdy or undisciplined activity which causes or is likely to cause annoyance, hardship or psychological harm or to raise fear for a fresher or junior student.
- 3. Ragging also includes asking a junior student to do any act or perform something which such student will not do in the ordinary course and which has the effect of causing or generating a sense of shame or embarrassment so as to adversely affect the physique or psyche of a fresher or junior student.

As per directions of the Hon'ble Court any student found guilty of ragging shall be immediately expelled from the college. Besides this, the police shall be informed and the proceedings of the criminal law set into motion against the offender in addition of heavy penalty as per directions received from competent authority from time to time including Ministry of HRD, the UGC and University of Delhi.

#### Ragging: Prohibited and Punishable Under Ordinance XV-C

The college through its Anti-Ragging Committee strictly follows the above mentioned ordinance both in letter and spirit. Any student facing any kind of ragging in any form should contact any member of Anti-Ragging Committee or the Principal's office immediately or may also contact as under:

#### (C) Prohibition of and Punishment for Sexual Harassment (Prevention, Prohibition and Redressal Act, 2013)

The college strictly follows this Ordinance of University of Delhi in letter and spirit. It seeks to maintain and create an academic and work environment free of sexual harassment for students, academic and non-teaching staff of the Delhi University. The ordinance will also apply to outsiders and residents, on the Delhi University campus, to the extent specified herein these rule and procedures. An Internal Complaint Committee (ICC) is to look after any such complaint.

#### **RTI ACT**

- An application for obtaining information can be made by paying the prescribed fee of Rs. 10/- payable to the Principal, Dr. Bhim Rao Ambedkar College. An appeal can also be preferred before the First Appellate Authority (Principal).
















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
